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Presentations

Presentations will begin in the middle of March. What are elements of a good presentation?

- One that is prepared well
- One that is fluid and seamless
- One that is engaged with the audience
- One that has useful content and includes visual elements
- One where the presenter doesn't read off the slides
- The text of the presentation should merely summarize what is said
- The presenter should project their voice

Tips:

- Know your audience.
- Know your information. Start with an outline and expand into it.
- You will have 30 minutes to present.
- In 10 minutes, the audience will remember three things. You need to share what you think is relevant to the audience.
- The presentation should end with three or four points that you want the audience to take away.
- Use visual elements to emphasize what you are talking about.
- Practice your presentation and know how long it takes to go through each part.
- Make eye contact with your audience and engage with the audience. Be aware of your body language.

- Don't mumble, project your voice, keep your voice at an even pitch and speak slowly.
- You are telling a story, provide a start, middle, and end.
- Use 30pt font, visuals, 10 slides maximum.

 - Donald Trump
 - Leonardo de Caprio
 - Al Gore
5. Closing Statements
